

Second, it is the only senior enlisted advisor chevron that has a four-star pattern incorporated into the design."



In November, Marine Corps Sgt. Maj. Troy Black will become the senior enlisted adviser to the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the top enlisted role in the U.S. military.

Lieutenant General Roy S. Geiger **Attends Japanese Surrender to Allied Forces**

On September 2, 1945, the Japanese Empire officially surrendered to Allied forces on board the battleship USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay, officially bringing World War II to an end.

With General Holland Smith having been transferred stateside in July of 1945, Lieutenant General Roy S. Geiger, who had succeeded Smith as Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, was chosen by Admiral Nimitz as the lone representative from the Marine Corps to attend the surrender ceremony.

Marines Attacked in Lebanon

On September 6, 1983, two Marines were killed and a further two were wounded when rockets hit their compound in Beirut, Lebanon.

Heavy fighting continued for the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit near their positions around the Beirut International Airport, culminating in the militant group Hezbollah bombing the Marine barracks in Beirut the following month.





Marine Raiders Strike Guadalcanal

On September 8, 1942, the 1st Raider Battalion and the 1st Parachute Battalion, carried out a successful raid on a Japanese supply base.

The Marines, who were supported by planes from Marine Air Group-23 and two destroyer transports, landed east of the village of Tasimboko, before advancing west into the rear of Japanese positions.

Marines Capture Wolmi-do Island

On September 15, 1950, the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines captured Wolmi-do Island in Inchon Harbor prior to the main landing.

That same day, the 1st Marine Division under the command of Major General Oliver P. Smith landed at Inchon in what is widely viewed as one of, if not the greatest, amphibious assaults of the 20th Century, and began the Inchon-Seoul campaign.





Joseph Vittori Medal of Honor

On September 16, 1951, Corporal Joseph Vittori, 22, of Beverly, Massachusetts, earned the Medal of Honor for his actions during the Battle of the Punchbowl near Songnae-dong, South Korea.

During the battle, Vittori's company was attacking Hill 749, on which North Korean troops had several entrenched positions. Following a North Korean counter-attack that resulted in heavy Marine Corps casualties, Vittori, along with two other volunteers, charged into oncoming enemy troops, engaging them in hand-to-hand combat to give his company time to consolidate its positions.

Later, Vittori volunteered to defend an isolated machine gun position on his company's flank. Over the next three hours, Vittori single-handedly fought to prevent enemy troops from breaking through Marine lines. Vittori repeatedly made trips through enemy fire to replenish his ammunition, manned a machine gun after the gunner was killed, and, despite North Korean troops closing to within feet of his position, Vittori continued to fight until he was killed. The following morning, Marines counted nearly 200 dead enemy soldiers in Vittori's vicinity.



Marines Raid Pirate Stronghold

On September 16, 1814, a detachment of Marines from the Naval Station at New Orleans under the command of Major Daniel Carmick, together with an Army detachment, destroyed a pirate stronghold at Barataria, on the Island of Grande Terre, near New Orleans. The stronghold was commanded by the famous pirate Jean Lafitte.

Military Operations in Urban Terrain Training Facility Dedication


On September 18 1990, the dedication of a 40-acre training facility for Military Operations in Urban Terrain (MOUT) at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. The dedication took place in a ceremony presided over by then-Commandant of the Marine Corps, General Alfred M. Gray.





Marines Cross Han River

On September 20, 1950, Marines of the 1st Marine Division crossed the Han River eight miles northwest of Seoul, South Korea. Five days later, the 1st and 5th Marines attacked Seoul and, by the 27th, had captured it.



Marines Land in Colombia

On September 24, 1873, 199 Marines and seamen from the USS Pensacola and the USS Benicia landed at the Bay of Panama in what is now Colombia, South America, to protect the railroad and American lives and property as local groups fought for control over the government of Panama.

Marines Secure Peleliu

On September 27, 1944, US Marines secured and raised the American flag over the island of Peleliu. Despite Marines securing the island, pockets of Japanese soldiers held out and continued to fight against American forces until April of 1947, nearly two years after the war ended.





Marines Assist China in Surrender of Japan

On September 30, 1945, U.S. Marines under the command of Major General Keller E. Rockey began landing in Northern China to assist the Chinese government accept the surrender of Japanese forces and repatriate Japanese soldiers and civilians.

THE 250TH UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS BIRTHDAY WILL OCCUR ON MONDAY, 10 NOVEMBER 2025.

SIGNED INTO LAW: Bill Cosponsored by Senators Hassan and Shaheen to Create Marine Corps 250th Anniversary Commemorative Coin

WASHINGTON – A bipartisan bill cosponsored by U.S. Senators Maggie Hassan and Jeanne Shaheen to authorize the U.S. Department of the Treasury to mint commemorative coins in honor of the upcoming 250th anniversary of the Marine Corps in 2025 was signed into law. The coins will be manufactured at no extra cost to taxpayers and proceeds from coin sales will support efforts to preserve and share the branch's history and tradition of service to our nation.

"The Marine Corps has kept our country safe, secure, and free for nearly 250 years, and the Marines' steadfast dedication to our nation deserves to be honored nationwide," **said Senator Hassan**. "I am glad to see our bipartisan bill become law, and I look forward to commemorating the 250th anniversary of the Marine Corps."

"For nearly 250 years, the U.S. Marine Corps has bravely defended our nation and helped keep us free," **said Senator Shaheen**. "In recognition of their unparalleled dedication and service to our country, I'm proud to have supported this law directing the Department of the Treasury to mint commemorative coins for the Marines' 250th anniversary."

The 250th Anniversary of the United States Marine Corps Commemorative Coin Act would instruct the U.S. Mint to issue 50,000 limited edition five-dollar coins, 400,000 one-dollar coins, and 750,000 half-dollar coins. Revenue from the sale of the coins would reimburse the U.S. Mint for designing and issuing expenses, with the remaining proceeds going to support the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation, a charitable organization that funds the National Museum of the Marine Corps and hosts educational, historical, and cultural programs.

We miss you all. Although we were not part of your family very long and it was difficult for us to get to those meetings, you all meant so much to us. We are back in Idaho and have purchased our old home back after nearly 11 years. The home and property were nearly destroyed by over a dozen and a half crackheads living here: several in each of the three bedrooms, several in the living room, one in the stove room, one in the chicken coop, one in the out building, one in a camp trailer, two in an abandoned motor

home, one in the carport, my shop was divided into several rooms, and they cut the trusses out in the Attic of the shop to accommodate another room, they had constructed a small fence post cabin and somebody was living in that, and so on. Also, roughly 30 cats with no litter box in sight. I have removed most of the garage (45,000 lbs., Yes, 22 tons of trash) so far. The smells are beyond discrimination! I am sure you can somewhat get the picture. All our children were born here and Tawnee wanted to save the place. Her wish is my marching orders. There is no way I can allow the family to even stay here, so we are living in a hotel in Ontario Oregon for the past month and will for another two months while I completely gut and rebuild the house. This is a very difficult time in every way possible. I am doing my best to hold everyone together and move forward with this enormous undertaking. We think of you all often and miss the friendship of all the league members to this associate.

This has been a real hard time for my family, but I am happy to report almost all members are recovering well for this health attack. I am still struggling quite a bit with breathing, and congestion problems. Fortunately, I have avoided pneumonia and that is a very positive report. Tawnee has had to take lead to try to get the house livable and she is doing an amazing job! All three of our children are back at it giving 110% cleaning, patching holes, learning how to run my texture gun, painting, small electrical repairs, and plumbing repairs. There is much they cannot do and our patiently waiting for me to get my feet back under me. I am giving it all I got every day until I run out of steam, So I guess the report is very positive and again thank you for your concern and prayers and God bless the League,


Robert Bowker and family

Good afternoon, Paul, and blessings to the entire league. We love you all and miss you. Covid reared its ugly head once again and has attacked our family and has laid us for the last several weeks. The youngests are doing the best and as predicted right up the chain to the oldest, I have had the roughest time. This is the first day in the last, almost 2 weeks that I have been able to function on a very limited basis and get back to work, it's been very mentally taxing to have to be sidelined with severe breathing difficulties and Non-Stop incisive coughing and hacking. Fortunately, we all made it through with God's help. We have now had to remove 54,500 lbs.of garbage, yes, 27 tons, all walls, all floors, all doors, all appliances, all switches, and plugins, and I could go on and on have had to be replaced. The kitchen is now 100% gutted with nothing but a functioning sink. The family has poured their hearts and souls into bringing our old house back to life. Every one of them would make any Marine proud of their deep dedication, drive, and devotion. I will keep you all updated with progress. If any of you would like to see pictures as things progress, please send me an email address and I can inundate you with pictures of

change.

Thank you so much for all your hopes and prayers, we greatly appreciate it.

We can't thank you enough for your concern and prayers. To this point, it's been just us five with no help from anyone. To have the league so clearly sending your love and your concern means the world to this family. We can't wait till we get to see you all again, should be a month or so. Till then, Blessings to the league and I'll continue to send you pics as progress moves forwards. Robert






This is the conditions to which we showed up to. We had no idea that they had destroyed our house. So far, we have hauled away 56,200 lbs. of garbage. Yes, over 28 tons. They also dumped between 1500 and 2000 tires that I am told will cost me \$125 per every 100 tires. Every door, every window, every wall was busted kicked in, bullet holes..... every single thing in the house was broken. Every light every fan water heater furnace... if it took electricity, it was broke. The main panel was ripped out the garage panel was ripped out. 2 months in a hotel. We've stripped the entire house down to the under laminate floors and studs and are re-sheet rocking re-carpeting reflooring, repairing the most essential things first so we can get away from that \$100 a night at the hotel..... as we can afford. I have an amazing crew That's doing so much with so little! The family has got past covid quite well. Tawnee is struggling a little, I am struggling quite a bit, but doing everything in my power to keep going... Blessings to you all, Robert.
